# **Toronto Saints Alumni Association Wins Award**

The Guyana Awards Council (Canada) has selected the St. Stanislaus College Alumni Association Toronto for its 2008 Community Service (Organization) award which was presented at a dinner/dance gala held at the Delta Hotel East in Scarborough (East Toronto) on Sat. 24 May, 2008. This award pays tribute to the past and current Association Executive Committees and to all those Alumni and 'friends of Saints' who have contributed in some way in helping to restore Saints to the glory of past days.

This Awards program was launched in 2000 under the stewardship of the (Toronto) Honorary Consul General of Guyana as part of the Guyana Independence • Community Service (Organization): St. Stanislaus commemorations in Toronto. It promotes the achievement of excellence and leadership in the Guyanese-Canadian community, and recognizes and honours the outstanding work of individuals and organizations contributing to the development of Guyana and to the continuation of Guyanese heritage and culture in Canada.

# New St. Stanislaus E-mail System

Most Alumni Associations try to keep in touch with former students with the expressed intention of soliciting for donations. I once checked out a University site in Britain, saw that they were trying to get in touch with me, responded (since I knew I didn't owe them money) but, instead of getting back in touch with some long lost friend, have regularly been appealed to for donations ever since.

The challenge that our Toronto chapter faces, with our limited means and small number of volunteers, is not only to raise money for the College through the wide variety of events that we sponsor but also to ensure that we keep in touch with our membership and with the school on a regular basis. A web-site alone is a rather impersonal way of contacting even local members to let them know of upcoming activities, and telephone calls are time-consuming. Modern technology offers a simpler solution of mass emailing, but not everyone necessarily wants his/her private e-mail address to be known in this day and age when these addresses are sold to spammers for profit.

Having explained the problem to John Sparrock, an alumnus resident in the US, I was very surprised to realise that he had come up with not only a solution to the immediate problem of keeping in touch with our membership but also one which introduced features that opened up new avenues for communicating with the teaching staff at Saints and for electronically delivering information that may assist in the teaching program. Furthermore, the same system could be used by the Executive and membership of the different chapters as well as the Board of Governors (BOG), enabling these diverse groups to contact each other, if they so desire, in an effective manner.

The solution involves setting up a universal e-mail addressing system that is different from personal addresses. **These addresses are to be used only for Saints-specific communications,** including the distribution of our newsletters. Although they eventually may become exposed and vulnerable to abuse, the risk is reduced significantly by basing the solution on one of the leading e-mail sys-

#### tems.

The approach chosen is to use Google Apps which uses gmail (along with all the Google spam filters), allows us to have a consistent address (which is @<u>st-stanislaus-gy.com</u>), and allows us to set up virtually unlimited e-mail addresses. So, even if at some point a private e-mail address is changed, it will still be possible to keep in touch with members. The complete rationale is given at <u>http://st</u>-stanislaus-gy.com/ssc-mail/

Further investigation of the system has shown other advantages. With the download of Google Talk, there is increased opportunity for instant messaging and for transferring large files.

The newly announced Google site,

<u>http://sites.google.com/overview.html</u>, provides for easy website construction, which should prove invaluable for IT students and for all teachers who may now be encouraged to place their lesson plans, homework assignments, etc., on their personal web site.

At present, over 200 e-mail accounts have been created from our existing alumni list. These include the Executives of all Alumni Associations, all members of the BOG, and all known Saints staff. Initial feedback has been very encouraging, and we believe that we have discovered a potentially effective way to bridge the digital divide.

If we currently contact you through your personal e-mail address and you have not yet been provided with your new Saints e-mail address, please contact John Sparrock (*jsparrock@st-stanislaus-gy.com*) to receive your new email address and your initial password. After you have been set up, you should use your new e-mail address for only Saints communications and your current personal one for all other mail. Just remember that you will now have to check two e-mail addresses for mail, one exclusively for Saints communications and the other for all other mail. *Godfrey Whyte*

# **Troubadours Steel Band**

It was the early 50's; my dad had died in 1950; I was already up to Grade 8 in music and couldn't sit the LRSM exam until I was 21 years of age. At the time, I was somewhere between 15 and 17 years old. I thought of forming a steel band with other musicians whom I knew and who were equally good on piano or violin. Here I was thinking that we would have the best 'pan' side in town as we all knew music. This would make 'playing pan' an easy transition...just hand out music sheets, and *voila*. Unfortunately, this was not to be. When I introduced each of them to 'pan', none of them could relate their musical expertise of piano or violin to 'pan', and could not transfer their talents to 'pan' playing. I was crushed with disappointment.

With my dad's passing, my mum could not really afford the cost of music lessons anymore, and I was just waiting to be eligible to sit the LRSM exam, so I told her I would study 'pan' instead. She accepted the idea, as I would still be doing music as far as she was concerned.

So, off to the Brute Force 'pan'-yard I went. The yard was opposite Radio Demerara, where I met the band-leader, Patsy. (Funny, today I am married to a lady whose name is Patsy. We have been married for 37 years and have 3 children, Rhonda, Glen, and Kelly.) I learnt how pans were made, how to tune them, and picked up 'pan'-playing relatively easily.

The first friend I spoke to was Leslie Fernandes. We were inseparable then, and he loved the idea. I bought a first 'pan' (melody pan) and a second 'pan' (accompaniment or guitar pan), and started teaching Leslie at 44 Brickdam where I lived with my mum and younger sister, Desiree (Ree). The first tune we played together was "*Pretend you're happy when you're blue*", sung by Nat King Cole, which was very popular at the time.

Then, the idea of having a 'road side' band struck me....it would be the first college-boy band ever to tramp on the road.

We got permission from Mr. John Fernandes ("Honest John") to use the John Fernandes wharf for practice, as we would have to practise not only playing the pan but also walking with the pans around our necks. We needed the space, not to mention the noise we would be making...the wharf was ideal.

Some of the names I remember...forgive me if there are any names that I forgot to include :

<u>On bass</u> : Vic Albertson, Tony Cox, "Konky" De Freitas, Roy De Freitas ("Honey Bear"), Peter Fernandes, Clive Fisher, Joseph Anthony Perreira ("Reds"), Compton Rod*rigues* ("water wings"..."flour god"). I think this completes the bass section.

<u>Tune base</u> : *Harold Gonsalves* ("Rook"), and myself (I also doubled on first pan).

<u>2nd. pan</u>: *Harold De Souza* (kb), *Alan Gonsalves, Woody Gonsalves, Romeo Mahanger, Maurice Serrao, Raymond Perreira,* "Prehistoric" (Pre, sorry I could never remember your proper name). There were also others in this section.

<u>1st. pan</u> : *Gayman Gomes*, *Dereck Gonsalves*, *Bing Serrao*, and at least 4 others also in this section. Forgive me, guys, we are talking 50 years ago.

There was a *Gerry Gouveia*, not the "Dude" but the one who lived in Kitty with 2 other brothers. I remember him posing with an army helmet, not playing but posing as an MP for the band and really hustling all the chicks. Yes, we had a superb following of chicks, all beautiful and, when the rains came, they looked even more exceptional when wet.

The first tune the Troubadours played on the road was "Chopsticks" which was made popular at the time by Liberace who played it in a movie.

Vic was still a student at Saints when he formed his band. He had both a small band for "house" parties and an enlarged band for street marches in the Christmas season. I attended both types of events as did many other Saints students who were joined enthusiastically by the girls from Charlestown High School (St. Joseph's) and Ursuline Convent (St. Rose's). Those were the days when one could take evening strolls along Camp or Main Streets right up to the Sea-Wall without worries of being robbed or attacked!)

attended that year and the next. I don't know whether it will be of any use, but the names of the attendees are of interest. You may use it as you wish.






