Supreme Pontiff of the Catholic Church

I speak, not disparagingly, of either Pope Leo I (440-461) or Pope Gregory I (590-604), the only two Popes ever called 'Great', when I say that Pope John Paul II is even greater than they. Among leaders of the free world, he was a humble, intellectual giant. Both in word and deed, he was humanity's newfound beacon of hope and moral courage. More than anyone else, both as a world leader and as Pope, he was right for the times.

"Lord, make me an instrument of Your peace . . ."

Pope John Paul II was the embodiment of such prayerful submission by Saint Francis of Assisi. In the summer of 1979 within nine short days, he had unleashed "revolution of spirit" that inspired the Polish populace to support their labour movement, Solidarity, in a bloodless revolt against the Soviet stranglehold on his homeland. That revolution was followed by widespread uprisings in the Czech Republic/Slovakia (formerly Czechoslovakia), spreading further south into Hungary, Yugoslavia, and fi-

nally Bulgaria. By 1986, Russia, unable to thwart these popular uprisings, granted these Eastern Bloc countries their independence, virtually peacefully. The influence of the Pope on these events has been confirmed by Mikhail Gorbachev himself who would later declare that "Democratization of Eastern Europe and the U.S.S.R. would have been impossible without the presence of this

In his travels to more than 125 countries during his 25-year papacy, his message had always been that his audiences were worthy of dignity, love, and peace.

"Where there is injury, pardon . . ."

> It was in him to forgive absolutely, being the Holy Father. In 1981, two bullets from an assassin's gun, at point blank range in Saint Peter's Square, nearly killed him. Only a few days after the assassination attempt, he exclaimed, "I pray for that brother of ours who shot me, and whom I soundly pardon." Two years later, he visited the convicted assassin, Mehmet Ali Agca, in prison, shook his hand, and even blessed him.

> As recently as 2002, he visited Afghanistan, an Islamic country, where he courageously condemned fundamentalist extremism and terrorism, declaring that no person should be killed in the name of religion.

> He professed guilt himself publicly, asking forgiveness of those who had suffered, because of the Church's past indiscretions. "No peace without justice, no justice without forgiveness" was his watchword.

In Memoriam

JIMMY THOMPSON

I first met Jimmy Thompson during the 1952-53 school year when he was put into my Lower 4A Form. His family had just arrived in British Guiana for his father, Colonel Thompson (lately of the British Army in Germany, I believe), to take up his new post of running the railroads. I last saw Jimmy in 1959, so there are many others who can claim longer (and possibly even closer) friendships with him, but Jimmy and I shared the important time of growing up together towards adulthood. Due to the fifty years of elapsed time, my memories of our times together are somewhat limited in number though, in some cases, paradoxically quite clear.

In the class-room, Jimmy sat one across and one desk in front of me. This enabled our friendship to develop quite naturally even though, unlike me, he was not a maths/ science enthusiast but was arts oriented, his favourite subject being English Literature. I believe that we all were fascinated by his Scots accent when he read assigned passages aloud, for instance "book" becoming "bu-k" and "look" pronounced "lu-k".

His football prowess was soon discovered by Fr. Lynch, and he was almost immediately promoted to the school's First XI, in spite of being in a low Form and being small in stature. I believe that this upset some of the members of the Fifth and Sixth Forms! On leaving school after sitting "O" Levels in the Fifth and then taking a job at Sprostons, he joined GFC where he became a prominent member of their football team.

After school-hours, Jimmy was part of a social group which included Mike Bunbury, brothers David and Douglas and cousin Richard Menezes, Michael Camacho, Ron Dias, and myself (I apologise if I've forgotten any others, Jimmy Thompson, front right, with friends, circa 1953 on Sports Day at but tempus fugit!). We often could be found at Mike Bun- the GCC grounds. Next to Jimmy is Joe Castaneiro, with Gerry Jekir bury's house, playing "ping-pong", board games, and card front left. games (whist and hearts were favourites). When wanting a particular card suit to be played, Jimmy was most transparent in making illegal non-verbal suggestions, like coughing and hitting his chest when Hearts was the desired suit! I don't know how Mike's parents ever put up with us at all hours of day and night!

Jimmy and I discovered that we had a mutual interest in that we both liked Broadway and Classical music. In the afternoons/early evenings, the "gang" would "hang out" on the Sea-wall by the band-stand and, on going home afterwards, Jimmy and I would bore the others by singing tunes from Broadway hits like "My Fair Lady", as we rode along on our bikes.

Quite often, we would go home via Main Street where we would drop into Ferraz' "cake-shop" to have a Pepsi, Peanut Punch, or whatever caught our fancy. It was here that we discovered that Jimmy was not the traditional "cheap" Scotsman. He was always quick to offer to pay, especially if someone happened to be financially short at the time.

After moving to Canada, I lost track of Jimmy and did not get to know him in his mature adult years. However, I do know that he really enjoyed living in Guiana. He always said that Guiana

His evangelism has always prevailed against man's arrogance and hostility in settling religious disputes. Through his vigorous ecumenism, initiated by his first encyclical, Redemptor Hominis (Redeemer of Man), he showed a genuine respect and appreciation of other Christian faiths. Through interfaith dialogue, he has set the tone for understanding, and reasonable resolutions in human initiatives.

"Where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is sadness, joy."

The Holy Father ascribed to faith, hope, and joy through prayer as substitutes for doubt, despair, and sadness. Prayer expresses our spiritual relationship with a supreme authority. It is the ultimate dimension of peace that surpasses our ability to achieve it otherwise. As head of the Vatican state, with full legislative, judicial and executive powers, he wielded great influence among world leaders. He had contributed more than any of them, to justice and freedom for all peoples.

This traditionalist Pope has had to face the angst of a new generation of worldly women, enamoured with the feminist movement of ultraliberalism, demanding radical reform in Canon law. His response has been a reminder of his role in the Church as he unapologetically declared, "This is not my teaching we are talking about. This is the teaching of the church. I cannot change that teaching. I have no right to change it." To succumb to demands

for the sake of political correctness would be to disavow the religious teachings of Catholicism.

The Church has changed, though not radically enough to suit the dissidents. It will continue to move forward, albeit moderately, in meeting new challenges of the 21st century, just as it had done by changing many secular traditions so far. But, it would be presumptuous of its followers to expect change, just for the sake of change or to satisfy man's immorality.

The Supreme Pontiff's sense of purpose for which he was created motivated him to serve humanity humbly, without all the traditional pageantry, pomp, and princely trappings of the Holy See, associated with his predecessors. He was TIME magazine's choice for Man of the Year in 1994. He may yet be revered as the Man of the Millennium.

Catholics mourn his passing with much grief, and pray for someone to walk in his footsteps as our new spiritual leader. We can only hope for this with measured optimism, so great a man was the Holy Father, but, as Tennyson once wrote, "More things are wrought by prayer than this world dreams of."
